TRADING HUT UPDATE

While the majority of the onion sets, shallots and seed potatoes sold extremely quickly we still have a few bags of main crop potatoes left, it's still not too late to chit and plant so if you're behind schedule and haven't yet bought any potatoes please call in and pick some up from the Trading Hut. Once again we'll operate our seedling swap table from the Trading Hut where we can 'bring and swap' surplus plants that we've enthusiastically cultivated at home.

Don't forget we also stock and extensive range of organic fertilisers and lawn treatments.

TIPS:

Pollinator friendly plants for an allotment include: borage, marigolds, cosmos, sunflowers, poached egg plant. Plant in between vegetable patches.

To improve the health of your strawberry plants and encourage fruiting, treat with a mixture of potash and sulphate of ammonia (2:1).

To encourage leaf growth on brassicas treat with a mixture of potash and sulphate of ammonia (1:2).

PATH MAINTENANCE

Now that the growing season is underway paths around the site have to regularly mow. Can everybody please be mindful of keeping paths tidy and free of stick, stones and brambles which can make cutting difficult and potentially damage the mowers which are costly to repair.

AGM SUMMARY

Don Jackson (Chair) gave his welcoming address and noted that the Society had had an exciting and financially successful 2015 after working with the television production team. The extra funds will be used to purchase topsoil to help plots affected by extensive flooding and refurbish the Hoedown. In November SHAS participated in the Remembrance Sunday commemorations; following the ceremony we received several interesting articles about the society and will use these as a platform to continue to build a historical picture of SHAS.

Jane Lucas (Secretary) thanked all the committee for their dedication in helping manage the site on members' behalf and special thanks were given to Steve Bingham for his work in upgrading the society's newsletter, Jonathan Richards for organising the annual plant sale and Jane Leicester for organising the talk given by David Metcalf.

Louise Black (Plots Secretary) reported that 11 plots had changed hands during the year with a waiting list of 10, most people waiting less than one year for a plot. Plot inspections took place in April, June and September and letters were issued and plots monitors that were considered neglected.

Peter Baggaley (Treasurer) thanked Jim Howling for auditing the accounts. The annual accounts were presented for the year ended 31 December 2015.

Tony Turnbull (Membership Secretary) presented a summary report of SHAS members which total 162, of which 103 are active plot holders. Tony confirmed that any increase in rent by Trafford would be phased in to avoid members receiving a steep and sudden increase. It was proposed and agreed to keep the membership fee at the same rate of 2017.

Elaine Watson (Trading Hut Manger) reported a successful year and confirmed that prices for stock had remained stable. New regulations meant the slug pellets had to be sold in commercial packaging although prices will remain competitive. Elaine thanked all the volunteers, with special thanks to retiring volunteers Brian King, Hazel Pritchard and Olga Odabashian.
