Chairman's Message

Hello again,

How our summer has flown! It has been exceptional for growing all crops including weeds. Last year several crops needed extra sowings for success, to the contrary, this year we have had good results with vegetables and fruit with friends and family welcoming any excess.

Our community plot, no 30, was started last year and is beginning to show results. We have had a few unwanted pests that we hope to eradicate for next year and the heavy pruning of the vines should show improvements next year. Many thanks to Leslie Enstone and Roger Snowden, plus others, for their help

Our drainage problem along the Carlton Road side of our allotments has continued and a blockage has now been found, TMBC and the Environment Agency (EA) have both been involved. A lack of funds and excavating plant has held up progress, however over the past few days a diverting ditch with pipework should be installed by TMBC.

At the last Trafford Allotment Watch quarterly meeting, we were given a talk by Cliff Norton of Viridor Transforming Waste detailing their reclaiming method from our Green Bin contents to "Revive multi-purpose compost", which can be purchased from their Sharston Road refuse depot, I will be testing this compost over the winter in my greenhouse.

However, it's not all positives this year. SHAS and other Trafford allotment sites have been experiencing theft of produce, both inside and by outsiders is suspected! TMBC Finance Dept have given warning of a 50% rent increase for 2014 which is not customer friendly to rate payers.

Regretfully, Sylvia who has been our Secretary for several years has tendered her resignation from the committee at the end of 2013. Sylvia has decided to reduce her activities and have a well-earned rest, many, many thanks Sylvia!

As always in my little update of SHAS I must thank you and our hard working committee and helpers for their work supporting SHAS particular thanks go to our new officer, Elaine our Trading Hut Secretary.

Watering Clarification

We have enjoyed a wonderfully hot summer this year and crops have definitely been in need of watering. There has in the past been some confusion regarding the use of hosepipes, so the committee would just like to clarify that while sprinklers are not allowed, handheld hosepipes are acceptable but these should not be left unattended, i.e. 'stuck up a tree'. Plot holders should consider other people's access to the taps and keep watering to essential crops.
