Allotment news

There has been a marked turnover of plots in recent months and we welcome all members who have waited so long to become plot-holders. There are now 93 plots at Grosvenor Road.

Cause for concern

If you cannot reach the top of your fruit trees without using a ladder, are they not too tall and are they not casting shade over other crops on your plot or your neighbours' plots?



When buying trees for your plot please ensure they are on a **dwarfing rootstock**. This means they will not grow too large and will leave space for other crops to thrive. If you have stone fruit such as Cherry, Plum or Damson, prune them back in summer. Summer pruning lessens the chance of disease entering the exposed cuts. Apples and pears can also be pruned back in summer to restrict their growth.

After the September inspection we will be writing to plot-holders whose trees are getting too big for the plot and its neighbours. Please do what you can to reduce their size now.

Virus and diseases

If you are new to a plot it is better not to accept cuttings of bush fruit from existing plot-holders however kindly meant.

It is better to buy fresh stock from a reputable source to avoid big bud and other debilitating diseases.

Theft

A wheelbarrow and watering can have been stolen from Plot 16b.

To avoid the attention of 'sneak thieves', please ensure you lock the gate when you leave the site.

Marking your tools may help deter theft. Stolen items should be reported to a member of the committee and entered in the book in the Trading Hut.
