After a successful growing year our site had been recognised by Trafford as the Most Improved Site, and Don thanked plot holders for their efforts and Roger and his team for keeping the paths in pristine condition. Our site also fought of stiff competition from other allotments and has been chosen as the back drop for a storyline on Coronation Street and filming is scheduled to continue until 19 June.

Jane Lucas (Secretary) thanked all the committee for their dedication in helping manage the site on members' behalf and special thanks were given to Steve Bingham for his work in upgrading the society's newsletter. During the year the society held a plant sale, featured twice on BBC radio and held an informal family and friends picnic in July.

Louise Black (Plots Secretary) reported that 13 plots had changed hand over the year, some people having to give up due to work, family commitments or health. The waiting list now stands at 15, with most people waiting less than one year for a plot.

Peter Baggaley (Treasurer) thanked Jim Howling for auditing the accounts. The annual accounts were presented for the year ended 31 December 2014.

Tony Turnbull (Membership Secretary) presented a summary report of SHAS members which total 160, 98 of which are active plot holders. Tony confirmed that Trafford's 2014 increase was being phased in over a two year period. It was proposed and agreed to keep the membership fee at the same rate of 2016.

Elaine Watson (Trading Hut Manger) reported a successful year and opening the Trading Hut on the first Saturday in the month has been well received and will continue. Elaine thanked all the volunteers who help in the Trading Hut.
