Litter picking May 2010

Following earlier discussion within the Committee, Wednesday 19 May was chosen as a day to clean up the litter from the perimeter of the allotment site. Edna and Marjorie Carline and Brian Eyden turned up at 1030 and spent the next couple of hours removing various forms of litter from the base of the perimeter fencing and hedges along Grosvenor Road and the short stretch of Glebelands Road. They then picked up some

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small items of litter on the allotment site itself, as well as some bigger items (mainly plastic bags) from under the hedge near the equipment hut. All in all, four plastic bags of rubbish were collected and these were deposited next to the rubbish already present within the middle manure bay. Some of the litter removed was quite old, including the plastic bags from near the equipment shed, so to a certain extent the allotment site has been "cleaned" as a result. This little project was facilitated and helped by Mark Dale (Principal Manager, Community Safety Patrol Team) and David Dale (Local Environmental Officer), both of Trafford Council. Mark Dale provided details of the Keep Britain Tidy website and this organization provided rubbish bags and tabards, some of which we have kept for any future litter-picking days we might wish to organize. David Dale provided us with the loan of litter-pickers and was kind enough to deliver them and collect them himself. The Allotment members and Committee would, I am sure, like to thank Trafford Council for their support.
