Plot holders What to do now

Having dug over your plot in Autumn....what? you didn't? then now's the time to do it! You can cover the earth with polythene or permeable membrane to kill the weeds, and this also has the effect of warming up the soil.

One of the first crops that can go in is **Shallots**. Then, if you like them, **Broad beans** can be sown straight into the soil. As with all the legumes, they like a trench of water-retaining compost to explore with their roots and the nitrogen forming nodules on those roots feed the soil in return.

Dig the trenches for **runner beans, peas, sweet peas** etc now and leave them open for some weeks to let the frosts kill off any bugs in the ground. Later, part-fill the trench with compost, growmore and bone meal and fork into the trench. The compost will help retain moisture for later in the year. Do NOT dig in any 'frosted ground' as this will take a long time to thaw out.

Line can be spread over a section of the plot each year, but it might pay to do a PH test to see where this is necessary. Remember never to mix line and manure as the resulting chemical reaction causes a loss of potency.

Fruit trees will benefit from a dressing of potash which helps flower and fruit formation.

Now is the time to prune the **Autumn raspberries** as they fruit on the current season's canes. Cut them back to ground level but if you cut some of the canes by half only they'll produce branches that fruit ahead of the rest, in June and July. After pruning, top dress the canes with compost to help preserve moisture.

Rhubarb can be forced to produce those delicate pink stalks by covering the plant with a bin to exclude light. The slugs will also enjoy the seclusion so take your usual steps to remove them. The plant is weakened by doing this so only do it to one clump at a time.

Dahlias are becoming fashionable again and the tubers can be set in damp compost in a light frost free place to begin their growth. Cuttings of the resulting shoots will give you more plants for this season.

Potatoes can be set to chit in a similar way on egg boxes.

Before the weather warms up **Seed sowing** can get underway in the greenhouse or on a light windowsill. Seed trays and pots should be scrubbed clean and good quality compost will make all the difference between success and failure. Don't be tempted to start indoors too early as the seedlings could grow very weak and leggy with poor light.
